Rationale	<p>Jesus is the central person in the Christian faith. His life and ministry occupies an essential place in Christian theology, history and ministry practice and is therefore of continued value in the formation of a student's life and ministry.</p> <p>This unit focuses on the life and ministry of Jesus including His character, relationships, teachings and ministry practice as found in the Gospel texts, and the different strategies of interpretations used by a range of scholars regarding these texts. It is designed to enable students to develop knowledge and critical skills that will help them to understand the life and teachings of Jesus more fully, and evaluate the contexts of biblical exegesis in ways that can be applied to ministry practice.</p>

Articulate a coherent hermeneutical framework for understanding and interpreting the life and ministry of Jesus from the Gospels; 2. Analyse characteristics of Jesus' life and nature and relate these to their own life; 3. Critically examine Jesus' ministry as portrayed in the Gospels and critically reflect on their significance for ministry practice; 4. Explore and critically analyse a range of scholarly views on the life and teachings of Jesus; 5. Exegete selected key passages in the Gospels relating to the life and teachings of Jesus using recognised scholarly approaches and methods; and 6. Communicate at an appropriate tertiary standard with special attention to correct grammar, punctuation, spelling, vocabulary, usage, sentence structure, logical relations, style, referencing and presentation.

Unit summary	<p>This unit provides an opportunity for students to engage with knowledge concerning Jesus as a person and as a minister at an advanced level. It further develops knowledge of the Bible and theology, particularly from an Evangelical and Charismatic perspective. By critically examining the life and ministry of Jesus, the unit contributes strongly to the student's personal formation for ministry practice.</p>
