Discuss the Biblical Christian perspective on business with particular emphasis on ethical issues concerning preparation of financial statements, financial management decision-making; 6. Analyse a case study and present an oral report as a member of a small team; and 7. Communicate at an appropriate tertiary standard: with special attention to design elements, grammar, usage, logical relations, style, presentation and referencing.
