Considered foundational biblical and theological principles of chaplaincy, including the organising motif of <i>shalom</i>; 2. Explored historical and contemporary approaches to chaplaincy and pastoral care; 3. Reflected on the personal attributes that contribute to a quality therapeutic relationship that characterises effective chaplaincy practice; 4. Analysed the theological and theoretical approaches to chaplaincy employed by contemporary chaplaincy organisations; 5. Integrated theoretical learning into their developing framework of chaplaincy practice; and 6. Communicated at an appropriate tertiary standard with special attention to correct grammar, punctuation, spelling, vocabulary, usage, sentence structure, logical relations, style, referencing, and presentation.
