<b>Rationale</b>	<p>This unit seeks to lay a foundation for the ongoing development of a Christian worldview as a paradigm that guides professional life.</p> <p>Core questions such as, “Where did I come from?”, “Who am I?” and “Where am I going?” are essentially spiritual questions regarding reality, meaning, purpose, identity and ultimate destiny. The Christian faith has long held that these core questions and their answers can be effectively explored within the context of a Christian worldview grounded in the Scriptures.</p> <p>This unit is designed to present a <i>raison d’être</i> for the relevance of the Bible as a foundation for professional life in a way that is creative and meaningful. In order to assist students to begin to understand the relevance of course themes to their personal and professional lives, opportunities will be provided to begin to apply Christian worldview principles and priorities to important contemporary issues.</p>
